Growing Larger, Stronger in 2018

ommunity Sharing Outreach Center (CS) is celebrating the new year by expanding its territory to offer support to individuals and families throughout the Huron Valley School District in 2017. The new area now covers 107+ square miles!



"We are getting bigger and better thanks to our supportive community and their generous donations and grants," says CS co-founder and board member Claudia Schimetz. "We also gained 10,000 sq. ft. of space in the move to the Duck Lake Center, which means there's more room for client



consult rooms, the food pantry, the clothing closet, garage sale storage, pet pantry, and more, so it only makes sense to utilize the space and offer services to a larger client base." The potential growth in client base means a continued consistent stream of income from donations and grants is vital to fund the growing services. "We are not sure how many new clients we will receive, but know the potential for several new families is quite a bit. The support we provide includes helping clients with food and clothing as well as financial assistance for a variety of needs such as rent to avoid foreclosures, new tires for a vehicle a client drives to work, utilities, medication and more," Schimetz explains. CS is a 501 (c)(3) and volunteer-based organization which allows ninety cents of every dollar to go directly to client services.

"We are open to being creative on what type of support we lend our clients. We some-



times help pay for car repairs because a client can't work or visit our food pantry if they don't have a vehicle. We recently helped a woman with a down payment on a mobile home, joining forces with Church of the Holy Sprit - St. Vincent de Paul and her family members to raise the funds needed to secure a home for her and her daughter," Schimetz says.

CS has been reaching out to potential clients. Word of mouth will be the most important tool for getting the message out, so please share the news with potential clients and/or people in positions to refer unemployed or underemployed members of our community.

The Great Recession (2007-2009) was the longest economic downturn since World War II, according to the Federal Reserve. It was extremely severe in Michigan so the long-term impact on the state's economy took a toll on small businesses like the one owned by past CS



clients, Maria and James. Their construction company was directly hit by the decline – leaving them unable to cover the cost of food, clothes and utilities for their family of five in 2011. That's when they turned to Community Sharing.

"Community Sharing volunteers had our backs when times were tough for our family. They also had confidence in me at a time when I didn't have confidence in myself," says Maria. "I was very blessed to have this service. The help we received prevented our children from having to truly experience the hardships we felt as parents. They didn't have to wonder if there would be something for dinner or shoes when they grew out of them. With Community Sharing's support, we went from barely having anything to securing two wonderful jobs with steady incomes and the ability to provide for ourselves. Without their support, I don't know where we would be now."

They credit their success to a CS caseworker who helped Maria secure financial support to pay for her college degree. "She encouraged me to apply for school grants and loans. After earning a BS degree Maria also pursued a real estate license. James returned to the construction business and secured a job with M.J. Whelan Construction of Milford, Michigan.

To celebrate the upswing in their lives, Maria and James now give back to the community. Last fall, Maria met a family who desperately needed a place to rent. As their realtor, she helped them find a home in White Lake and then in lieu of earning a commission she put the money toward the security deposit. "Because I had been in their position, I understood the stress of having no place to live.

Maria and James offer this advice to current clients: "Sometimes it may feel like you're going backward, but never give up and keep striving to move one foot forward. Always know you are better than you think you are. You will succeed if you try and never give up."

Barb Maher – Founder, Friend, Champion

Founder and board member Barb Maher was really excited about expanding CS to serve all of Huron Valley School District and worked hard last spring to make the transition to the new Duck Lake Center seamless for clients. Unfortunately, Barb was not able to attend the ribbon cutting ceremony for the new facility. We lost our dear friend and dedicated volunteer. It was so sudden that it's been hard to process that Barb is gone, but we know she is always with the CS family of volunteers in spirit.

Barb was passionate about her charitable works; her giving heart was huge. She was a champion in making sure hungry people were fed and she was a friend to everyone

As we begin 2018, it's time to reflect on our accomplishments in 2017 and set goals for the new year. Community Sharing offers vital support to families in need thanks to the generosity of the community when it comes to volunteer hours, food and clothing donations, monetary contributions and support of key fundraisers like the Empty Bowl Project, Trivia Night, golf tournament and garage sales.

Volunteers were instrumental in helping CS make its big move from the Apollo Center to the Duck Lake Center in July. We now have three times the space and will be able to expand to serve clients throughout the Huron Valley School District.

The new facility features an inviting waiting area for clients when they check-in and meeting rooms for private meetings with caseworkers. The food pantry is so spacious it feels like a grocery store. There's ample storage for volunteers to stock the shelves and organize food items. The Clothing Closet now has a room to accept and sort items with an adjoining room where items are on display for clients to browse and select clothing. Even the grounds look amazing thanks to volunteers who spent several hours pulling weeds, moving rocks and trimming shrubbery.

Two hundred and seventeen children started the new school year sporting a new outfit thanks to the expanded Back to School program led by volunteers Sara White, Helen Adams and Amanda Theriault. Each child received two new outfits, a pair of shoes, underwear, socks, personal items and snacks. Stylists at Great Clips in Milford and J Klips in Highland gave many of them haircuts to make the students feel extra special. The cuts were provided at a reduced rate and paid for by monetary donations to the Back to School fundraiser.

The Main Event for the 3rd Annual Empty Bowl Project was a great success thanks to the generosity of our sponsors, bowl painters, volunteers and event participants. They joined together in support of Community Sharing's efforts to eliminate hunger by enjoying delicious bowls of soup and bread donated by local restaurants. Trivia Night and the Golf Outing also helped fill the pantry by raising more money than ever! Please consider joining in the fun at these events this year: Trivia Night on February 3 and Golf Outing on June 1. Our spring garage sale was great last year and should prove to be bigger than ever in 2018. Please donate items and join us to shop on April 18-21.

Lastly, we celebrated the holidays with the Joy of Giving program. Many people donated holiday gifts to help client families put gifts under their Christmas tree for their children.

Pet Pantry Keeps Clients, Pets Together

Imagine the agony of taking your pet to a shelter because you can't afford to feed him. Community Sharing's Pet Pantry helps clients keep their pets (dogs, cats, birds, ferrets, hamsters, rabbits, etc.) at home when they hit hard times.

"It's also an important extension of CS because clients may be inclined to short-change themselves on meals," explains Karen Gordinier, volunteer manager of the Pet Pantry. "We know clients who would open a can of tuna and give it to their dog before feeding themselves. Our pet



pantry allows clients and their pets to both eat healthy every day."

On average, the panty serves 350 pets per month – offering pet food, supplies, medication as

well as financial assistance for vet bills. "One of our clients always described the amusing antics of his 15-year -old dog, Buddy. Then one week he was sad because Buddy could no longer walk and would willingly carry Buddy wherever he needed to go. When it was nearing time he took Buddy to the vet and was astounded at the cost of euthanasia. "We needed to help so contacted a local vet and informed them that the Pet Pantry would pay for Buddy's last visit," says volunteer Marilyn Stepanek.

The pet pantry is independently funded and operated by volunteers, relying on donors and the generosity of businesses like Walmart and Waterfall Jewelers of White Lake. All donations are welcome including food, pet beds, leashes, puppy pads, blankets, toys, cat litter, flea and tick medication and money. "The financial support helps us purchase these necessary items and allows us to help our clients when needed. As example, worst-case scenario, we can help pets get to the "Rainbow Bridge" with the least amount of suffering," Stepanek explains.

Food Pantry Recognize CS Volunteers "Community Heroes"

Besides keeping the pantry stocked and the clothing closet full, volunteers make sure that students of families with limited resources don't miss lunch during summer break. They also have a big heart for Harbor High students, who often go to school hungry, so breakfast snacks are made available. "Because of our community supporters our volunteers can help ensure kids get what they need. It's a top priority here at Community Sharing," says Roberta Lennie, Volunteer Coordinator.

Every once in awhile something very special comes along that catches the attention of volunteers. Recently, a disabled single mom just couldn't meet the demands of caring for her home while caring for herself and her daughter. In stepped CS, along with another local agency, a church and a heartfelt private individual. Pulling all the

resources together, volunteers were able to relocate this small family in to a safer and more suitable home. Volunteers love to step-in to help someone step-up.

The volunteers can do their jobs because our community cares enough to support Community Sharing. Your donations are always welcomed.

GOOD PRACTICES FOR OUTREACH CENTER DONATIONS

We have become an exceptional outreach center because of your support and generosity. As we wish to continue to enjoy this reputation through expansion, we need to follow three good practices for donations.

Practice #1

Provide good, healthy food for families in need. Encourage donors when cleaning out pantries to make certain they discard expired items.

Guide: If it's not good enough for your family to eat, don't pass it along to a family that may be desperate enough to risk eating it.

Practice #2

When providing "gently used" in-season clothing, items must be clean and in good condition. They should not have broken zippers, missing buttons, be stained or ripped. *Guide:* Do the "wearable" test... Would I be seen in that? My kids?

Practice #3

Fundraising with Garage Sales is a plus but items must be purchase ready. Items should not be broken and must have all parts and pieces. Linens must not be stained or torn. Items should be usable. *Guide:* Garage Sale Test - "Would my friends want to buy this from me?" If the answer is no, please recycle.
