Community Sharing Helps Young Mother Regain Independence - She Helps Community Sharing

Lynette was a new mother with a two-year-old daughter when the violence started. Her home became a danger zone instead of a sanctuary. The one person who should have been the protector became instead her attacker. Lynette and her husband tried to work it out. She went to counseling and he enrolled in a batterer's program. Sadly, he was unable to control his temper. When Lynette gained enough confidence, she fled with nothing but her daughter and a few items of clothing, while her husband kept everything they owned. Fortunately, she was able to move in with her sister.

Lynette discovered CS's services during an online search for assistance. For 2.5 years she received the help she needed to recharge her life and provide for her daughter. "CS provided more than a financial lifeline. Volunteers were there for me when I needed comfort, clothes and food. It's a network of community members that are willing to lend their support," says Lynette. "My daughter had dietary problems so the pantry of choice allowed us to select foods that she could eat. When I was looking for a job, they provided interview outfits."

Today, Lynette is independent with a full-time teaching job. She has given back to the community by volunteering and has passed her spirit of giving on to her daughter. At ages 11, 12 and 13 her daughter hosted holiday gift parties to collect donations of personal products, hats, gloves and toys for young family members of CS clients.

This is truly a success story. We asked Lynette and her daughter if they would share their story of support from CS, not just here but in our upcoming video. The answer was yes and we are thrilled. Helping people like Lynette is proof that the support services and volunteers of CS can make a difference.

Thanks to You, Community Sharing's Commitment for 2019 Has Been Realized

As we reflect on our accomplishments of 2019, we want to share with you, our volunteers and supporters, the services we provided (Part I) and the fundraising events (Part II) that allowed Community Sharing to have a great year.

Part I - Services Provided

In each of the last twelve months, Community Sharing (CS) managed approximately 21,750 lbs. of food (see chart below) to supplement the groceries for an average of 275 families per month. Purchasing food for the pantry is complex, but at the heart of it is community generosity. Fundraising and monetary donations provide the funds to purchase the bulk of our food from Gleaners Community Food Bank, as well as local sources for fresh produce, milk and eggs. Other sources of food include generous community food drives, along with government assistance from *The Emergency Food Assistance Program* (TEFAP), and *Focus HOPE* (Federal and State Government). CS is also fortunate to receive food from Forgotten Harvest, a surplus food rescue program in Detroit.



Each year, the children are foremost on our minds as we plan in what services we should provide. For example, this past summer we made certain that 14 children enjoyed CS scholarships for YMCA summer camp. To help with lunches when school is out, children of clients who receive government sponsored lunch during the school year, received 20 bags of easy-to-prepare food and snacks each month. Volunteer Corkie Sprague, says, "Our clients make it very clear how much this program is appreciated." In addition, the Back to School clothing program was a great success this year. A record 160 children were provided new and gently used clothes and shoes, new underwear and socks, and free haircuts.

Summer was soon over and attention turned to helping the children stay warm during the school year. Just then we received over 50 new winter coats, compliments of the Knights of Columbus, Milford Council #7444. To supplement this wonderful gift, CS purchased snow pants, boots, gloves and hats for clients' children. Currently, the Joy of Giving Christmas program is in full swing, with the support of you, our generous community. This year clients will choose from donated gifts, allowing them to wrap and give personally selected gifts to their children on Christmas morning.

CS also provided financial help to clients, assisting with housing problems that cause financial strains. For example, helping with rent, finding short-term housing for the homeless, and subsidizing a few energy bills that could have devastated struggling families. CS funds also helped replace a water softener, repair a frozen pipe, clean a malfunctioning septic tank, pay some medical prescription bills and repair a few cars to enable individuals to get to work. "It's been a busy and very full year at the Duck Lake Center," says Claudia Schimetz, board vice president.

We can't thank you enough for your donations of new and/or gently used items - they are vital to this cornerstone fundraiser. Since May, 19 business owners signed up for the new Sponsor-A-Shelf program. Volunteer Marilyn Stepanek says "Many of these business owners signed on for lengthy periods of time once they became aware of how the program directly fulfills the needs of our clients.
